
Cornwall's industrial development is of global significance; that's why we have a World Heritage Site

In 1935 a small group of enthusiasts set out to prevent a Cornish beam engine from being scrapped. They started with a whim engine at Levant Mine, which was then 100 years old, and formed the Cornish Engines Preservation Committee.

This later became the Cornish Engines Preservation Society and a Registered Charity. In 1971 the CEPS was formally amalgamated with the Cornish Waterwheels Preservation Society, and the Trevithick Society was formed.

Those early members had the foresight to see that they were preserving something unique for the future and established what is now the oldest industrial preservation society in the country, and probably the world.

Over the following years its members acquired and safeguarded some of the iconic beam engines that were once so common in Cornwall and now form an important part of its heritage and tourism scene today.

Society members receive four newsletters every year and a well-respected, and award-winning, journal which has been published since 1973. Over the years we have also published a variety of learned books on a number of subjects related to Cornwall's industrial heritage.

We welcome approaches from individuals and other bodies. Our volunteer members have given educational lectures, published books, been an intellectual resource, restored steam to the Levant Mine engine and built a full-sized working replica of Trevithick's first self-propelled road locomotive.

The Society has also accrued an enviable collection of Cornwall's industrial artefacts, some of which can be seen at heritage exhibitions throughout Cornwall and beyond.

During its long and eventful life the Society has broadened its interests to cover all aspects of the history of industry and technology of Cornwall.

The Society is a Registered Charity (Charity no. 1159639), controlled by a Council elected by members.
